## Foreword

The Kagoshima University Research Center for the South Pacific (KURCSP) carried out its third scientific survey in Papua New Guinea in 1983. The survey took place mainly in Lae and Port Moresby as joint projects with the scientists of the Papua New Guinea University of Technology (PNGUT) and the University of Papua New Guinea whose outcome appeared both in "The Prompt Report of the Third Scientific Survey of the South Pacific," published in 1984 and in the "Scientific Survey of the South Pacific, 1981–1983: Fiji, Solomon Islands and Papua New Guinea" issued as Occasional Papers No.5 of KURCSP in 1985.

Taking the opportunity of our stay in Lae, a workshop was designed on marine science under the joint auspices of the Department of Fisheries, the PNGUT, and the KURCSP. The workshop was intended not only for the exchange of scientific information, but to increase the effectiveness and productivity of collaborative works between us in the future.
